

Inclusion Saskatchewan's Position Statement on Inclusive Education



What is *Inclusive Education*?

Inclusive Education is how a school system works when all students learn together in the same classrooms. This means that *all* children go to their neighbourhood school and are in a regular class with students their own age. It also means that they get the supports they need within their class and are not grouped into classes based on ability or disability.



How are students with disabilities excluded in Saskatchewan schools?

Every student should be supported to learn, grow, and connect with their peers. Separating students with disabilities prevents them from being able to do this. Some students with disabilities are only allowed to attend for shorter days, or fewer days per week. Some are not allowed to attend school at all and have to do their schooling online. Some are not allowed to attend in regular classes and instead stay in a class just for students with disabilities.

What is *Ableism*?

Ableism is a type of discrimination that comes from the belief that non-disabled people are "normal" and that anything else is unwanted or bad.

Ableism causes systems to be built in ways that stop people with disabilities from being included in the same ways as people without disabilities.

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Why should we have inclusive education in Saskatchewan?

Inclusive education is good for all students, even if they don't have a disability! Research shows us that students without disabilities who learn in the same class as students with disabilities feel better about themselves and have more positive attitudes towards people who are different from them. Students with disabilities who learn in inclusive classes can expect better outcomes in post-secondary, independent living, and employment. All students in inclusive classes can benefit from higher scores in reading & math and are more likely to graduate from high school.
